The expected pencil grip developmental stages for this age group and advice on how to support children through them.




#### Sitting position for handwriting

The best sitting position, when handwriting, for both right and left-handed writers.


# I Handwriting Animations & Worksheets



We provide four possible handwriting teaching routes based on the order you want to teach the fonts.






On the next pages are the expectations for each year group. However, individual children may be working at different stages – focus on completing each stage before moving on to the next.

# **Reception:**

Reception children should be holding their pencil correctly, writing on the line and forming most lowercase letters correctly.




- Stage 1: Pre-handwriting Patterns

- 2 Stage 2: Numbers Beginner





#### Year 1:


Year 1 children should be writing on the line, holding their pencil correctly and forming <u>all</u> numbers and lowercase letters correctly.



- Stage 2: Symbols Beginners (?! £ only)
- 2 Stage 2: Continuous Cursive Refiners (focus on one 'family' at a time)
- Stage 2: Capitals BeginnersStage 2: Numbers Refiners

## Year 2:

Year 2 children should be forming <u>all</u> numbers, capitals and lowercase letters correctly, beginning to join <u>some</u> letters and thinking about the relative size of their letters (e.g. d is taller than a.)

Letter Joins

- Stage 2: Capitals Refiners
- Stage 3: Letter joins (focus on one 'family' at a time)



# Year 3,4,5,6:

KS2 children should be joining full words, with letters sized appropriately (e.g. d is taller than a). Neatest handwriting is expected at <u>all</u> times.



Address gaps as required from previous year group expectations.

2 Stage 2: forming f, x, 8, £

Stage 3: joining from the bottom
